The New York Rangers went 16 seasons before they saw another addition to this list. Jaromir Jagr broke the club's single-season goals record in 2005-06. Chris Kreider scored 50 goals, tying Adam Graves for second place in 2021-22. Only four NYR have eclipsed the 50G plateau. Only three players got on this list post-lockout; teammates Panarin and Kreider did so in a three-season span.



The NHL began tracking hits in 2007-08, so the club's hits record is likely inaccurate due to the high volume of physical play since the league's inception. Alas, Will Cuyllé is now the NYR single-season hits record holder, posting an immaculate 300 checks last season. The two and three-spot? Ryan Callahan in 2009-10 (285) and Ryan Reaves in 2021-22 (279). Cuyllé is 22. Reaves was 34.

Will Cuyllle set the club record for hits in a season with 301. He overtook Ryan Callahan's 285 in 2009-10. Ryan Reaves ranks third with 279 hits (2021-22). Callahan owns three of the top five hits in a season spots.



Alexis Lafreniere had more EVG this season (15) than Jake DeBrusk, Steven Stamkos, Juraj Slafkovsky, Connor Bedard, Evgeni Malkin, Aleksander Barkov, Andrei Svechnikov, and Cole Perfetti.



The New York Rangers' 17.62% % power-play percentage ranked 28th in the NHL. It is the club's lowest percentage since 2014-15 (16.81%). That ranked 21st in the NHL, but the team won the Presidents' Trophy with a 53-22-7 record.



The Rangers scored 18 short-handed goals (SHG), which is the second-highest total in club history. The 1993-94 Rangers scored 20 SHG, which is tied for ninth all-time in total shorthanded goals in a season.



Braden Schneider ranked 18th in the NHL in defensive zone giveaways with 71. That total tied him with Erik Karlsson and Cale Makar.



Artemi Panarin finished with the most shots that missed the net (161) and the 8th most shots blocked (188). He still led the club with 37 goals, 11 more than Vincent Trocheck, who finished in second place.

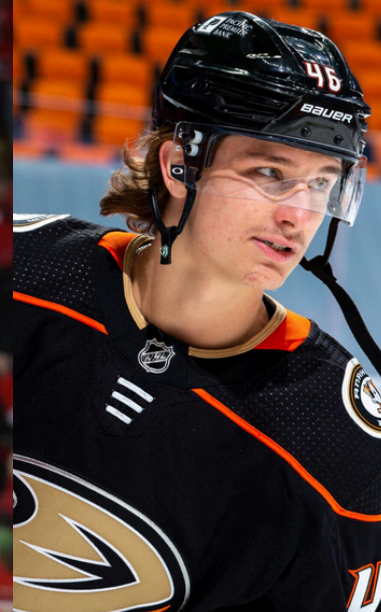

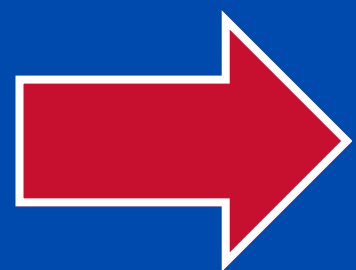

A History From Ryan Gropp to EJ Emery





Ryan Gropp

**41st OVERALL-Seattle Thunderbirds
2015 NHL DRAFT**

The Rangers sent their 2015 first-round draft selection to the TBL as part of the haul for Martin St. Louis. As a result, they did not have a draft selection until pick #41 in arguably the greatest NHL draft of the early 21st century. Names such as Connor McDavid, Jack Eichel, Sebastian Aho, Mikko Rantanen, and Mitch Marner painted the top of the amateur selection event. Gropp performed well for the Seattle Thunderbirds (WHL), primarily because he was Mat Barzal's linemate. Gropp would play three AHL seasons for the Wolf Pack before moving overseas. The history books will always display Gropp as the Rangers' choice in one of the best player selection pools to date. Par for the course.



Sean Day

**81st OVERALL-Mississauga Steelheads
2016 NHL DRAFT**

Sean Day, to this day, is one of nine players to receive “exceptional status” from the CHL. Exceptional status was instituted in 2005-06. This rule allows select exceptionally talented players to become eligible to play full-time in a CHL league at age 15. Again, the Rangers drained draft capital, meaning their first selection would be pick #81 (3rd round). Day performed well in the OHL in his draft year, not to the exceptional standard perceived when he was 15, entering the OHL. Day skated in Ranger training camps until 2020 and suited up for 62 AHL contests before he signed with the TBL on July 17th, 2020. He played in 2 NHL games in 2022, and now plays overseas.



Lias Andersson

**7th OVERALL-HV71 Jonkoping
2017 NHL DRAFT**

Broadway drama wasn't enough for the 7th overall draft pick. His Ranger tenure was *The Kardashians*. The New York Rangers traded Derek Stepan to the Arizona Coyotes just one summer after going through the arbitration process to sign the team's 1C. In return, they received the 7th overall draft selection. It was the club's first time in the top 10 since 2010 (Dylan McIlrath). After the tumultuous Swedish silver medal incident and a strained relationship with the JD-Gorton leadership duo, Andersson would play in 17 games in the 2019-20 season. The once-promising "steady" center was moved to LA on Oct. 7, 2020, for the Kings' second-round pick (NYR drafted Will Cuyille). A character pick turned heel.



Vitali Kravtsov

**9th OVERALL-Traktor Chelyabinsk
2018 NHL DRAFT**

Kravtsov was the only “off-the-board” pick of the 2018 NHL Draft. In hindsight, it was a pool with many hits and misses, but wildly at the ends of that bell curve. Kravtsov signed his ELC in May 2019 and played 39 games in Hartford in 2019-20. He returned to Traktor Chelyabinsk (KHL) for the following two seasons. The situation quickly became hairy. The scoring winger returned to Russia for 2021-22 after failing to make the team out of camp. He finally earned a role on the big club in the fall of 2022, four years after he was drafted. In a highly anticipated opening night, Kravtsov was injured on a hit by Victor Hedman. Kravtsov was traded to VAN before the 2023 TDL to make room for the Kane/Tarasenko splashes. Didn't have enough space to write all the theatrics. Kravtsov was given every chance to make the team, but for all his skill, he was not built for the physicality required to thrive in the NHL.



Kaapo Kakko

**2nd OVERALL-TPS Turku
2019 NHL DRAFT**

The New York Rangers jumped from the 6th overall slot to the 2nd overall slot in the 2019 draft lottery. Jack Hughes and Kaapo Kakko jockeyed for the first overall selection, and the Battle Of The Hudson was bound to see one of the all-world prospects in their sweater at the start of the 2019-20 season. Enter Kakko, who posted a record 22G in SM-Liiga (Finland) in his draft year. The stud prospect also scored the sensational go-ahead goal in the 2019 WJC. The NBC graphics/analysts team stated that Kakko had “no flaws” on draft night. His adjustment to the NHL was not easy. Dietary needs, Covid-hindered seasons, a coaching carousel, and production woes ultimately led to Kakko earning two bridge deals and limited trust. During his sixth season on Broadway, he was traded to the Seattle Kraken for Will Borgen. Kakko posted 30 points in 40 GP to conclude 24-25 with SEA.



Alexis Lafreniere

**1st OVERALL-Rimouski Oceanic
2020 NHL DRAFT**

The highest NYR draft pick from 1964-2018 was Brad Park, who was selected second overall in '64. With the bubble playoff in 2020, it was the first time since 1983 that a team that made the playoffs could win the draft lottery. The NYR jumped nine spots in the draft lottery and got the first-overall pick for the first time in club history. It was a no-brainer; Lafreniere was the anticipated #1 for two years. Following two subpar seasons, the "Kid Line" found chemistry as a checking/scoring trio in the 2022 playoffs. In 2024, No.13 flanked the best line in the NHL, skating with Artemi Panarin and Vincent Trocheck. He inked a 7.45 x 7 deal in October 2024, although his performance in 24-25 further indicated that his ceiling is still in question. Is Lafreniere in favor of Drury? Is he a trade piece?



Brennan Othmann 16th OVERALL-Flint Firebirds 2021 NHL DRAFT

Chris Drury's first draft selection as GM of the Rangers was Othmann. The draft took place on July 23rd, two months after a catastrophic conclusion of the shortened 2021 season. The club was adamant about adding players with bite into the lineup. This factored into Othmann's selection, a scoring winger who could deal checks in high-intensity contests. The NYR needed center depth badly, but the management wanted a skater who fit their desired prototype. Othmann played for the Flint Firebirds (OHL) and had put up 50G, 97 PTS in his draft year. He continued to succeed in the Ontario league, winning the Robertson Cup in 2023. To the assent of the fanbase, the organization provided Othmann more development support than Kakko/Lafreniere, and the prospect played in parts of two AHL campaigns for the Wolf Pack before jumping to the NHL.



Adam Sykora

**63rd OVERALL PICK-Nitra MHC
2022 NHL DRAFT**

The Rangers' unprecedented ECF run saw WPG receive the NYR '22 first-rounder as part of the Andrew Copp deal. The organization liked Sykora's package. He is a player with an unlimited motor, premium gasoline, and is a puck hunter. Scouts stated that he demonstrated a strong work ethic, physical play style, and a knack for finding ways to contribute. Sykora has played for the Hartford Wolf Pack for three seasons, scoring 30 points in 71 games in 2024-25. It remains to be seen what his future is with the organization. Could he become the next Yannick Gourde?



Gabriel Perreault

**23rd OVERALL-USNTDP
2023 NHL DRAFT**

Most puck-knowers saw Perreault slide after pick 12 in the 2023 NHL Draft and immediately prayed that he'd fall to pick No.23. After a brutal ECQF loss to NJ, the fanbase sought any reason for consolation. That came in the biggest first-round draft slide the NYR have ever received. Perreault holds the record for the USNTDP's most points in a single season, with 132 points in his draft-eligible year. That bests players such as Auston Matthews and Jack Hughes. Perreault skated two seasons for the Boston College Eagles (NCAA), taking the program to the 2024 National Championship. He signed an ELC contract on March 31st, but his handling by the sinking PL staff caused many concerns. How will Drury-Sullivan handle the playmaking phenom?



EJ Emery

**30th OVERALL-USNTDP
2024 NHL DRAFT**

We have spoken to Steve Ellis, Daily Faceoff Prospect Analyst, on PTCS twice. He has shared his thoughts with us about Emerym, stating that he is one of his favorite prospects in hockey: “EJ Emery is going to be a top-four defenseman and better than people think.” For a second year, the Rangers selected from the USNTDP. Considering the NYR won the Presidents' Trophy and reached the ECF, it was refreshing to see the club retain its first-round pick and get a valuable prospect from the selection rather than trading it for an aging veteran. Emery projects as a stay-at-home defenseman who can develop at the Ralph in North Dakota (NCAA).

The New York Rangers currently hold the 12th overall draft selection in the 2025 NHL Draft. The catch- which selection should be given to PIT due to the JT Miller trade, a 2025 or 2026 first-rounder? The predicament is precise: The NYR will not have a first-round pick in one of the next two drafts. Draft analysts do not believe this year boasts a deep crop of impact first-round selections. The 12th pick in recent draft classes includes players such as Matt Boldy, Anton Lundell, Martin Necas, Noah Dobson, and Cole Sillinger. The Rangers need organizational center depth. Do you bank on last season being the ultimate failure and returning to success in 2026, thus giving PIT the '26 pick, which could be later than 12th based on the NYR's success? Or move the '25 pick and retain the '26 pick as a safe option?



Kaapo Kakko

Reg. : 3-5-8 in 19 GP

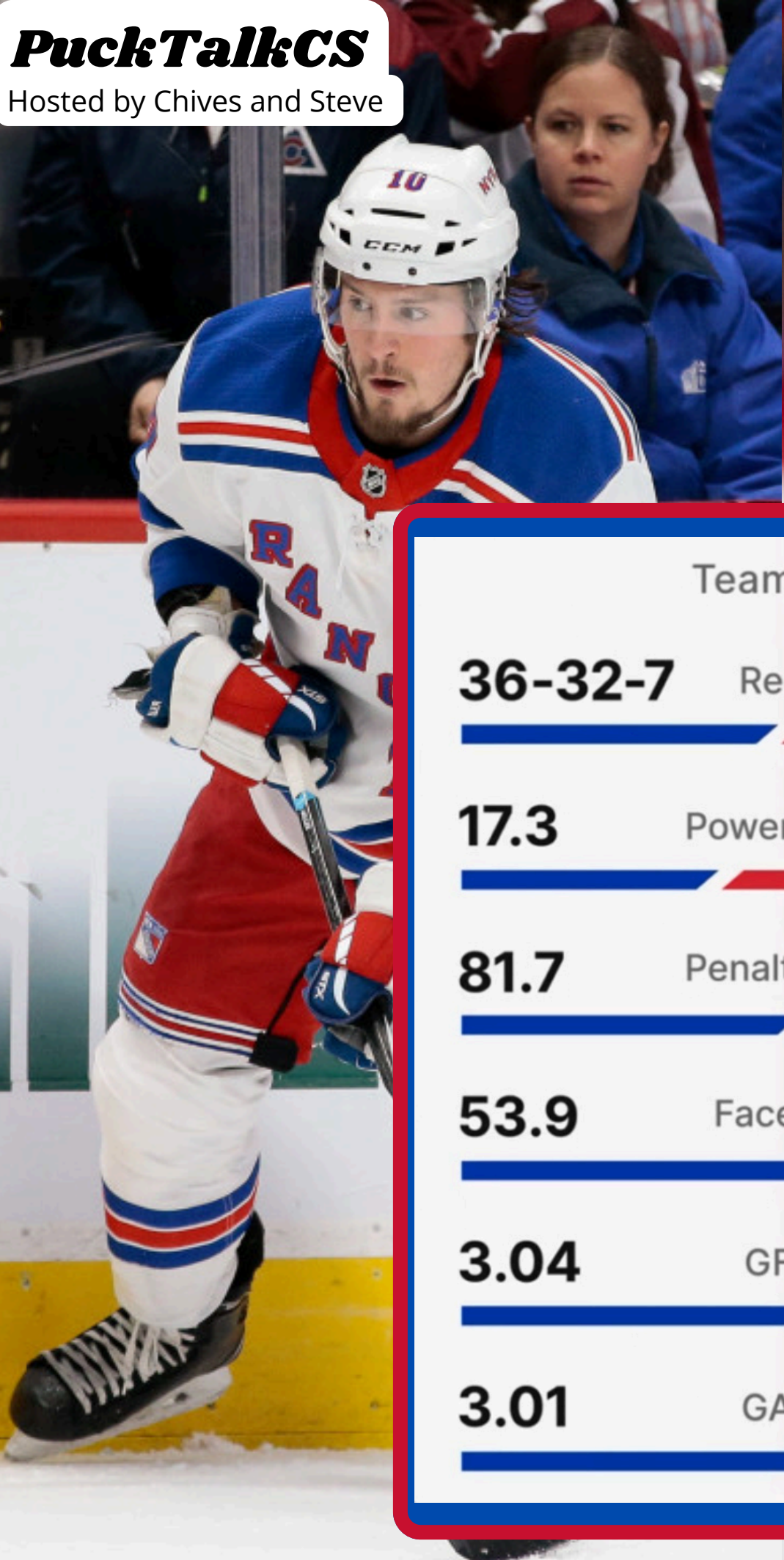

The Rangers acquired Roslovic at the TDL buzzer, swapping a conditional 2026 fourth-round pick to acquire the speedy RW. The 27-year-old brought subtle playmaking that had its moments, but his forechecking and turnovers sank the optimism that he was playing fine as a complimentary skater. It is unlikely the Rangers offer a deal to his camp as a UFA. His game was mostly on the perimeter, Drury looked like a genius in the first round but his lack of jam was frustrating in the by the ECF. New York will need to address the 1RW, a position they've needed since 2021.
